

What Is Arts-Infused Education?

Arts-infused (or arts-integrated) education is the practice of teaching "through" and "with" the arts to build skills and teach classroom subjects across different disciplines, including reading, math, science and social studies.



Benefits of High-Quality Arts Education

- Improved **student achievement** and **transfer of skills** from learning in the arts to learning in other academic areas
- Improved student motivation and engagement, including improved attendance, persistence, focused attention, heightened educational aspirations, and intellectual risk taking
- Development of habits of mind, including critical thinking, creative thinking and problem solving skills
- Development of **social competencies**, including collaboration and teamwork skills, self-confidence and social tolerance
